But how far does this song go? Some historians refer to a 1719 opera called Kingdom of the Birds, in which one character sings: In the fields in the frost and snow, there I keep my father's cows, boeing here, boeing where, where Boo, We defy all care and controversy, in charming country life. In 1908, a 74-year-old woman in a London workhouse was recorded singing a song called The Farmyard: Up was I on my fa-ther's farm On a May day morn-ing ear-ly; I feed fa-ther cows on a May day when there's moo moo and moo moo here, here moo, here moo, here moo, here's a moo, here's a moo, here's a pret-ty moo. Six maids come and gang me into the greenfields of the farm. By 1917, a more recognizable version was released in a collection of World War I songs: Old Macdougall had a farm in Ohio-i-o, and on that farm he had dogs in Ohio-i-o, string wow here, and bow-wow there, here a bow, there wow, everywhere string-wow. The most modern version simply reels off various barn animals with the accompanying sounds, each verse adding the previous sound to a long string until by the end of the song the children are mooing, neighing, barking, meowing, quacking and clucking. The song can continue as long as the singers are patient and come up with new animals to add to the repertoire.
